

Those employees working in the steam tunnel are exposed to Fahrenheit temperature of 120 to 140 degrees while working. Normally this area is well around 200 degrees, but before the workers enter, it is blown out. Thus, temperature for working is in the 120 to 140 degree level. The workers are rotated, exposures are interrupted by frequent breaks, and they are subjected to a screening examination quarterly with due attention to chloride loss and replenishment. Annual Physical examinations are given all workers in hazardous occupations. A tetanus immunisation program was instituted in September 1964 for all in hazardous jobs. Boosters are given to those previously immunized. Basic series are given those without prior immunisation. Occupational Vision and Hearing Conservation Programs are in force. Employees with acceptable vision in only one eye regardless of occupation are issued Safety Glasses. An initial and a yearly audiogram is made on employees with a history of Mastoidectomy, Chronic ear infection or defective hearing no matter what his job assignment. (OVER)





2. Pre-Placement examinations are done on civilians seeking employment.
3. Physicals including chest x-rays are done annually on all food-handlers and barbers.
4. Audiometric Testing is done on individuals working in areas of high noise intensity.
5. X-rays are taken on occupational injuries.
6. Visual and Hearing Acuity Tests are done on operators of heavy equipment and passenger vehicles.
7. Visual Safety Program is in effect for those whose work calls for it. Safety prescription glasses are provided when necessary.
8. There are visual inspections of Plant pertaining to:
 1. Sanitation
 2. Plant facilities for the protection and health of workers.
9. Tetanus Immunization Program is in effect for those who volunteer to be immunized.


Dr. J. M. Morgan, Jr., VMI Research Laboratories, Virginia Military Institute, Lexington, Virginia, reviewed radioactive waste disposal files in connection with a study.

Direct medical support was given to the USAMICOM Staff during this period. Medical surveillance includes research and development, (Including new and little used propellants); ionizing radiations from various types of emitters; noxious fumes and explosives; routine chemical laboratories, machine shops and fabrication plants; surface treatment areas; insect and rodent control; foundry workers; welders; lead workers, (Spray painters, lead burners, battery workers, body repairmen, et, al); refrigeration and air conditioning; vehicle and forklift operations; missile fuel handlers of various types; trainees and permanent party exposed to microwave transmitters; beryllium workers, (Milling, drilling, turning, etc.); noise exposures; and potential hazards in high-level magnetic fields.

Projected workload for August 1965 was 2,470 outpatients and thirty physical examinations. Actual accomplishment was 2,486 outpatients and 169 physical examinations. Workload was within normal limits.

1. Due to the increased number of pre-employment physical examinations, in support of the South East Asia emergency, all eight screening and screening physical examinations, annual physical examinations of key personnel, routine physical examinations of spray painters and sandblasters were cancelled for the months of July and August. In addition to the increased workload it has become necessary to give medical coverage to a second shift of ammunition employees, reducing our nursing staff on the day shift to four nurses to cover the main dispensary and one outlying dispensary. It now appears the second shift will continue indefinitely as maintenance division has a second shift in operation. Pre-employment physical examinations, including chest X-ray, kann, urinalysis and hematocrit, completed during the period 17 July - 31 August 1965 were 277.

a. An increase in the number of new injuries and more serious injuries can be attributed to new, inexperienced employees. There were 436 injuries and redresses for August 1965 as compared to 382 for August 1964.

b. To complicate the situation even more this emergency came at a time when vacations, which had been scheduled in March 1965, had to be cancelled with not much time remaining for personnel to reschedule leave before the end of the year. Therefore, it will be impossible to complete the routine examinations and screening tests originally scheduled for 1965.

2. Visitors: Major Clyde J. Roberts, MSC, Preventive Medicine Branch, Office of the Third Army Surgeon, visited this installation to familiarize himself with the overall preventive medicine and occupational health programs and provide any technical and/or guidance. He also made a check on the status of action taken on recommendations contained in the most recent (April 1964) Report of Industrial Hygiene Survey conducted by the U. S. Army Environmental Hygiene Agency, Edgewood Arsenal, Maryland. His report was very complimentary.

General.—All Army installations within the scope of SR will prepare the Quarterly Army Federal Civilian Employees' Health Service Report DA AGO Form for submission in duplicate through channels within 10 days following the close of the quarter period covered (viz., Jan.-Mar., Apr.-June, July-Sept., Oct.-Dec.). The commanding general of the Army Area or oversea command in which the installation is located will retain one copy and will forward the other copy to the Surgeon General. No letter of transmittal will accompany the report.

Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

Item 1.—Self-explanatory.

Item 2.—The average daily strength of civilian personnel employed during the quarter is obtained by dividing the sum of the daily strengths of civilian personnel employed on each workday during the quarter reported, as shown on the daily strength return of civilian employees, by the total number of workdays in the quarter.

Item 3.—Indicate the principal industrial activities and specify any inherent occupational hazard which the health service medical program is designed to control: e. g., noxious fumes, mists, or gases, dust, explosives, lubricants, solvents, radium, etc., other mechanical or operational hazards. A positive statement is desired.

Item 4.—Indicate number of personnel at time of making report. Include contract surgeons under "a. Medical Officers or Physicians." If there is more than one work shift, enter number of department personnel on each shift.

Item 5.—Classify equipment according to those Medical Supply Catalogue designations for unit equipment which it most closely approximates (see section: "Industrial Dispensary Supplies and Equipment," ASF Manual M210). Indicate other major equipment or accessible facilities under item 8.

Items 6-7.—Entries in these items will be based on WD AGO Form 8-175, COMPILED DAILY AND MONTHLY TALLY SHEET.

Conditions reviewed by the Medical Officer for duty assignments included: Post operative conditions--Bunionectomy, removal of cataracts, other eye surgery, spinal surgery, gastrectomy, intestinal resection, hip surgery, lumbar sympathectomy, pilonidal cyst, cholecystectomy, hysterectomy, herniorrhaphy, detached retina. Other conditions included: Parkinson's disease, anxiety reaction, cardio vascular accident, gout with effusion both knees, dislocation of knee, back injury, duodenal ulcer, cervical disc and severe diabetes.

Handicaps classified included: Impaired function of lower extremity, defective vision, organic heart disease, compensated, history of mental illness, deformity of upper extremity, and loss of hearing.

Diagnostic x-rays of occupational injuries were 25. Other laboratory procedures totaled 813. Orthorater examinations were 640. Number of patients referred for refractions were 51. Number of electrocardiograms 17.

Industrial optometrist saw 388 employees, ordered 177 new pair of glasses and repaired 16 pair.

Inspection was made of various working areas during the report period. Numerous complaints have been made concerning the noise in the Maintenance Division. A sound level measurement was made by the Sixth US Army Industrial Hygienist in representative areas throughout the maintenance shop to determine if safe levels were exceeded at occupied locations. Octave band analysis was conducted at those locations at which the overall level was above 90 decibels. No change was noted in areas, other than those previously considered hazardous, that is the Pangborn sandblast booth and the engine test cell operation. In these areas employees are supplied and use hearing protective equipment. The command has also initiated an engineering study of the noise problem. A repeat sound level measurement will be made in October by the Sixth US Army Industrial Hygienist.

During the report period the electricians, automotive mechanics, key personnel and steam fitters were given periodic physicals.

The Army Corps of Engineers and Army Reserve Center with a combined population of 491 civilian employees are limited to services of treatment of industrial injuries, pre-employment and periodic physicals. Strength is not included in No. 2.







The commanding general of the Army Area or oversea command in which the installation is located will retain one copy and will forward the other copy to the Surgeon General. No letter of transmittal will accompany the report.

Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

Item 1.—Self-explanatory.

Item 2.—The average daily strength of civilian personnel employed during the quarter is obtained by dividing the sum of the daily strengths of civilian personnel employed on each workday during the quarter reported, as shown on the daily strength return of civilian employees, by the total number of workdays in the quarter.

Item 3.—Indicate the principal industrial activities and specify any inherent occupational hazard which the health service medical program is designed to control: e. g., noxious fumes, mists, or gases, dust, explosives, lubricants, solvents, radium, etc., other mechanical or operational hazards. A positive statement is desired.

Item 4.—Indicate number of personnel at time of making report. Include contract surgeons under "a. Medical Officers or Physicians." If there is more than one work shift, enter number of department personnel on each shift.

Item 5.—Classify equipment according to those Medical Supply Catalogue designations for unit equipment which it most closely approximates (see section: "Industrial Dispensary Supplies and Equipment," ASF Manual M210). Indicate other major equipment or accessible facilities under item 8.

Items 6-7.—Entries in these items will be based on WD AGO Form 8-175, COMPILED DAILY AND MONTHLY TALLY SHEET.

General.—All Army installations within the scope of SR will prepare the Quarterly Army Federal Civilian Employees' Health Service Report DA AGO Form for submission in duplicate through channels within 10 days following the close of the quarter period covered (viz., Jan.-Mar., Apr.-June, July-Sept., Oct.-Dec.). The commanding general of the Army Area or oversea command in which the installation is located will retain one copy and will forward the other copy to the Surgeon General. No letter of transmittal will accompany the report.

Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

Item 1.—Self-explanatory.

Item 2.—The average daily strength of civilian personnel employed during the quarter is obtained by dividing the sum of the daily strengths of civilian personnel employed on each workday during the quarter reported, as shown on the daily strength return of civilian employees, by the total number of workdays in the quarter.

Item 3.—Indicate the principal industrial activities and specify any inherent occupational hazard which the health service medical program is designed to control: e. g., noxious fumes, mists, or gases, dust, explosives, lubricants, solvents, radium, etc., other mechanical or operational hazards. A positive statement is desired.

Item 4.—Indicate number of personnel at time of making report. Include contract surgeons under "a. Medical Officers or Physicians." If there is more than one work shift, enter number of department personnel on each shift.

Item 5.—Classify equipment according to those Medical Supply Catalogue designations for unit equipment which it most closely approximates (see section: "Industrial Dispensary Supplies and Equipment," ASF Manual M210). Indicate other major equipment or accessible facilities under item 8.

Items 6-7.—Entries in these items will be based on WD AGO Form 8-175, COMPILED DAILY AND MONTHLY TALLY SHEET.

6a1. Occupational Illness: Under Number of Cases per month enter total from column 9 ("New Illness") for corresponding month on TALLY SHEET.

Under Number of Treatments per month enter sum of totals from column 9 ("New Illness") and column 10 ("Old Illness") for corresponding month on TALLY SHEET.

6a2. Occupational Injury: Under Number of Cases per month enter total from column 7 ("New Injury") for corresponding month on TALLY SHEET.

Under Number of Treatments per month enter sum of total from column 7 ("New Injury") and column 8 ("Injury Redressed") for corresponding month on TALLY SHEET.

6b. Nonoccupational Illness and Injury: Under Number of Cases per month enter total from column 11 ("Number Cases") for corresponding month on TALLY SHEET.

Number of Hours Lost: (For Occupational Illness and Nonoccupational Illness and Injury.) Entries will be based on data assembled from WD AGO Form 8-172, MEDICAL ABSENTEE RECORD.

7a-7h. Enter sum of totals for columns similarly titled on TALLY SHEETS for the 3 months covered in the quarterly period (e. g., for item 7a, Preplacement Examinations, add totals of column 2 ("Preplacements") on Tally Sheet for January, February, and March, or whichever 3 months are embraced by the report).

Item 8.—State major causes for "Rejections," item 7d above. Also include here any preventive medicine activities or data not previously covered (e. g., material compiled in columns 4 and 17 of TALLY SHEET). Note any health education program in effect, such as Safety, Nutrition, Personal Hygiene, Public Health, Control of Sick-Absenteeism, etc. Indicate, when significant, predominant types of illnesses treated for items 6a1 and 6b above. Include comment on any condition that needs correction.



Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

Item 1.—Self-explanatory.

Item 2.—The average daily strength of civilian personnel employed during the quarter is obtained by dividing the sum of the daily strengths of civilian personnel employed on each workday during the quarter reported, as shown on the daily strength return of civilian employees, by the total number of workdays in the quarter.

Item 3.—Indicate the principal industrial activities and specify any inherent occupational hazard which the health service medical program is designed to control: e. g., noxious fumes, mists, or gases, dust, explosives, lubricants, solvents, radium, etc., other mechanical or operational hazards. 

October 1965

Projected workload for the month of October 1965 was 3,970 outpatient treatments and thirty physical examinations. Actual accomplishment was 4,711 outpatients and 341 physical examinations. Workload reflects a plus of 1,052, which can be accounted for in the increased number of pre-employment physical examinations, laboratory procedures and X-ray work.

November 1965

Projected workload for November 1965 was 2,470 outpatient treatments and thirty physical examinations. Actual accomplishment was 1,721 outpatients and 55 physical examinations. Workload reflects a minus of 724. Procedures in Medical decreased from 5,052 in October to 1,776 in the month of November. Pre-employment physical examinations in October 345 as compared to 55 in November. The decrease can be attributed to curtailment of hiring of trades helpers. The local Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners suspended certification from the trades helper register until an audit of the previously issued certificates could be made. Medical took advantage of the lull to allow its personnel to utilize annual leave which would be lost if not taken before the end of the year.

The only periodic physical examinations which have been kept current are the renewal of material handling equipment operator permits.

December 1965

Projected workload for December 1965 was 2,470 outpatient treatments and thirty physical examinations. Actual accomplishment was 2,013 outpatients and 113 physical examinations. Workload for December 1965 reflects a minus of 374.

1. VISITORS: Col. Albert K. Schoenbugher, Chief of Professional Services and Lt. Col. Robert E. Nitz, Chief of Preventive Medicine, Third United States Army, Fort McPherson, Georgia were visitors to the Medical Office on 3 December 1965. We had the privilege of discussing some of the problems which have confronted Medical since 1 July 1965, such as:

a. The sudden increase in pre-employment physical examinations, 1,013 completed to date, with no increase in Medical personnel.

b. The addition of a second shift on the Depot requiring medical coverage, thereby reducing the nursing staff on the first shift. The need for a space to employ an Occupational Health Nurse.

c. The problem of frequent transfer of Laboratory Technician (Military) and the lapse of time between departure of one technician and the arrival of the replacement. Medical recommended this position be filled with a civilian.

d. Discussed also was the overcrowded conditions in the Dispensary and the need for a new wing to relieve the situation. Also visitors were asked to include in their report a recommendation for an addition to the building.

e. Annual leave to Medical personnel could only be granted on an extreme emergency basis through July, August, September and October. During the lull which followed (November and December) there were 471 hours annual leave granted to Medical employees, which accounts for so few periodic examinations during November and December. The regular periodic examination schedule has not been resumed.

f. Suggestions and procedures were requested for guidance and better management in emergency situation of this nature which can occur in the future.

2. All new employees in Ammunition Division have completed the Tetanus Toxoid Series.

3. Employees in Water and Sewage Branch were given booster in Typhoid-Paratyphoid Vaccine.

During this report period preventive medicine inspections were conducted of the Officers' Open Mess, NCO Club, 74th Engineer Company Mess, Enlisted Mens' Annex, the Depot Cafeteria and Canteens No. 3 and No. 5. Operation of these food service facilities conforms with regulations pertaining to sanitary requirements.

A complete course in Medical Self-Help was presented to 18 civil service employees at this depot in November, 1965.

Two civil service employees were found to have active pulmonary tuberculosis in October, 1965. These individuals have been hospitalized at Battley Hospital at Rome, Georgia. All contacts have been given the Tine tuberculin test. A chest x-ray and sputum culture were taken on persons whose Tine test showed a possible positive and these sputum cultures are being processed at Third U. S. Army Medical Laboratory. All laboratory reports received on these sputum cultures up to the present time have been negative.

Depot military and civilian personnel donated a total of 569 pints of blood during the Red Cross Bloodmobile visit to this installation in October, November and December, 1965.



General.—All Army installations within the scope of SR will prepare the Quarterly Army Federal Civilian Employees' Health Service Report DA AGO Form for submission in duplicate through channels within 10 days following the close of the quarter period covered (viz., Jan.-Mar., Apr.-June, July-Sept., Oct.-Dec.). The commanding general of the Army Area or oversea command in which the installation is located will retain one copy and will forward the other copy to the Surgeon General. No letter of transmittal will accompany the report.

Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

Item 1.—Self-explanatory.

Item 2.—The average daily strength of civilian personnel employed during the quarter is obtained by dividing the sum of the daily strengths of civilian personnel employed on each workday during the quarter reported, as shown on the daily strength return of civilian employees, by the total number of workdays in the quarter.

Item 3.—Indicate the principal industrial activities and specify any inherent occupational hazard which the health service medical program is designed to control: e. g., noxious fumes, mists, or gases, dust, explosives, lubricants, solvents, radium, etc., other mechanical or operational hazards. A positive statement is desired.

Item 4.—Indicate number of personnel at time of making report. Include contract surgeons under "a. Medical Officers or Physicians." If there is more than one work shift, enter number of department personnel on each shift.





No letter of transmittal will accompany the report.

Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

Item 1.—Self-explanatory.

Item 2.—The average daily strength of civilian personnel employed during the quarter is obtained by dividing the sum of the daily strengths of civilian personnel employed on each workday during the quarter reported, as shown on the daily strength return of civilian employees, by the total number of workdays in the quarter.

Item 3.—Indicate the principal industrial activities and specify any inherent occupational hazard which the health service medical program is designed to control: e. g., noxious fumes, mists, or gases, dust, explosives, lubricants, solvents, radium, etc., other mechanical or operational hazards. A positive statement is desired.

Item 4.—Indicate number of personnel at time of making report. Include contract surgeons under "a. Medical Officers or Physicians." If there is more than one work shift, enter number of department personnel on each shift.

7a-7h. Enter sum of totals for columns similarly titled on TALLY SHEETS for the 3 months covered in the quarterly period (e. g., for item 7a, Preplacement Examinations, add totals of column 2 ("Preplacements") on Tally Sheet for January, February, and March, or whichever 3 months are embraced by the report).

Item 8.—State major causes for "Rejections," item 7d above. 



SUBJECT: Quarterly Army Federal Civilian Employee's Health Service Report

Handicaps classified included: Impaired function upper extremity, deformity lower back, impaired function lower extremity, impaired hearing, organic heart disease, diabetes and emotional problems requiring special placement.

Conditions reviewed by the Medical Officer for duty assignments included: Post operative conditions, hysterectomy, spinal surgery, eye muscle and upper lid, Other conditions included, gastric ulcer with hemorrhage, spontaneous pneumothorax, arthritis, infectious mononucleosis, severe hypertension, coronary insufficiency, intercostal neuralgia, diabetes, fracture vertebrae and fractured left hand.

Diagnostic x-rays of occupational injuries were 30. Other laboratory procedures totaled 1187. Orthorater examinations were 720. Patients referred for refractions were 34. Electrocardiograms were 40.

Optometrist saw 445 employees, ordered 226 new pair of glasses and repaired 18 pair.

Final reports on the sound level measurement made by the Sixth US Army Industrial Hygienist have not been received. From information available it was determined that ear protective devices would be worn continuously by those employees working in the Pangborn sandblaster, plating and aluminum rooms and steam clean booth. Employees working in the motor test block, cabinet shop and vehicle spray booth will only wear ear protection devices when these areas are in operation. The ear plugs have been furnished and fitted by the medical officer for personnel in the areas noted above.

During the report period three employees were checked for possible contamination with Strontium 90. Blood samples were sent to Radio Isotope laboratory at Letterman General Hospital and were all within normal limits. Complete blood counts and urinalysis were normal and will be repeated in one month.

During the report period the electroplaters, security guards and metrology workers were given periodic physicals.

During the month of November 750 civilian employees were given influenza vaccine.

A contract surgeon (part-time) is now at the Branch Dispensary #1, USASCC-CONUS, Davis, California. Preplacement and periodic examinations will continue to be given at the USA Dispensary, due to limited physical facilities at the Branch Dispensary. The civilian strength is included in 2 of this report.



The commanding general of the Army Area or oversea command in which the installation is located will retain one copy and will forward the other copy to the Surgeon General. No letter of transmittal will accompany the report.

Items in this form will be completed by the health service medical officer, physician or nurse at the reporting installation. All medical data will be based on records kept by the health service medical department at the installation.

The form will be completed in its entirety; a negative report for an item will be indicated by "0" or "NONE."

A verbal report from the employees' who received the influenza vaccine was favorable as they stated the cold symptoms were not so severe and of shorter duration. They felt it was to their advantage to have the vaccine. 7 b. In addition to the mentioned number of examinations, a total of nine employees' received disability retirement examinations, and all were retired. 7 d. 2 rejections due to emotional disturbances requiring continued treatment. Occupational injuries consisted of low back sprains; fall on stairs with resulting body bruises; ankle and shoulder sprains; lacerations; F/B in eyes; minor contusions and abrasions. Little lost time from occupational injuries. The scheduling of periodic physical examinations is becoming more current and many are done in conjunction with the complete voluntary examination program. Employees in noise hazard areas are checked closely for use of ear plugs and are being co-operative. A survey of our visual program is planned for Feb. and all assistance will be given to this project.


